Our Integrated Services

The Care Service addresses the comprehensive and complex needs of families and individuals facing crisis, such as homelessness, hunger, mental and physical health disorders, lack of basic necessities, untimely death, and multiple issues that confront families who are dealing with poverty. Utilizing wrap-around services, we work with our clients to achieve stabilization and systemic change in their lives, which also impacts the overall health and preservation of our local communities. Systemic change occurs when the root cause of the problem is strategically addressed and fundamentally changed through behavior modification and collaboration. Our goal is to provide the tools and support to our families who put in the work to make these life-altering changes. Our programs include:

Housing Assistance - Financial assistance and case management for individuals and families in crisis to remain or become housed.

Children and Family Development - Comprehensive case management, tools and services for families with children, 18 and under, who are homeless or in crisis, in order to become self-sufficient and achieve stable housing.

Street Outreach - Tangible basic needs, case management, housing options, and access to health care for literally homeless individuals.

Food Pantry- Weekly assistance to families/individuals. Our Client Choice format helps meet nutritional needs and upholds dignity through freedom of choice.

Adopt-A-Family - Christmas program providing meals, gifts, and basic needs for individuals and families. Through direct community involvement, over 500 families are served each year.

Disaster Recovery - We are a first responder, frequently called to assist in the immediate and long-term coordination of community-wide disaster efforts, and a member of Community Organizations Active in Disaster (COAD).

Client Story

When Jennifer and Andrew came to the Care Service, they were living in a hotel room with their three small children. The family had been evicted from their mobile home after the landlord decided to rent the property to a family member.

Andrew was working full-time at a local factory, but with a spotty rental history the family needed help with a deposit to get into a new place. Social Service Worker Kari helped the family search for housing and advocated to landlords on their behalf. The family found a mobile home and the Care Service was able to pay a deposit and the first month's rent. The Care Service also assisted with a utility deposit and Kari connected the family to Sharing Shed for furniture.

Andrew's vehicle was in the shop, but the family could not afford to pay for the repairs. He got rides from co-workers to make sure he didn't miss any work, and Kari helped the family develop a budget so Andrew could pay off his car repairs.

The family was waiting to be approved for food stamps, when Kari found out the family was searching dumpsters for food. Kari not only provided several bags of emergency food the next day, but also connected Jennifer and Andrew to a local food pantry in Lincoln County.

After a few months of assistance, the family was able to pay all of their bills on their own, including the car repairs. Andrew got a better paying job, and Jennifer plans to work part-time once the girls are back in school.

- The families that we assist are often served through more than one program. The numbers shown in the Assistance by Program table represent unduplicated services within each program but a duplication of services may exist between programs.
- The Food Pantry Program served 361 unduplicated households resulting in 5,305 food distributions throughout 2019.

Housing Program Outcomes

- 87% of households reported living in a place that is safe, secure and stable three months after receiving financial housing assistance
- 100% of households that were within 14 days of an eviction received financial rental assistance and remained housed 3 months later
- 79% of homeless families who were assisted through our Housing program were in permanent housing at the time they exited the program
- 66% of homeless families were housed within 40 days of entering the Housing Program
- 75% of homeless families who exited the Housing program to permanent housing remained housed one year later
- The Street Outreach program served 289 individuals leading to 766 encounters on the streets. As a result of the program's efforts, 15 of those individuals assisted were moved into permanent housing.
- 1,626 unduplicated children were served across all of our programs in 2019.

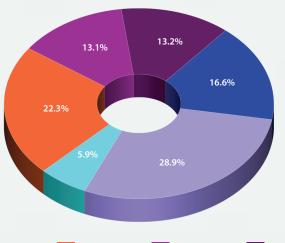

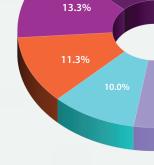
